Humans need animals to survive. Not just those that provide food and companionship, but also the ones that people normally avoid. Recent medical breakthroughs have produced evidence on the potential life-saving capabilities of many creatures, including those that are normally considered dangerous to humans.

Not many people like spiders, but they can do more for humans than simply killing other insects. The silk web material from the banana spider has shown the ability to assist in the growth of skin cells. As opposed to silkworm silk, the human body isn't resistant to the spider's silk. Therefore, scientists believe it can be used for burn victims and other people that need artificial skin. The hobo spider, found in Europe and the U.S. Pacific Northwest, is feared for its painful bite. The

venom contained in the bite can kill human tissue and flesh. However, according to scientists, a neurotoxin found in the venom could possibly be used to treat nervous system disorders such as chronic pain. Venom from another small bug is being looked into for cancer treatment. The deathstalker scorpion's venom also contains a neurotoxin called chlorotoxin, which scientists say is more effective at killing brain tumors than any other alternative.
